

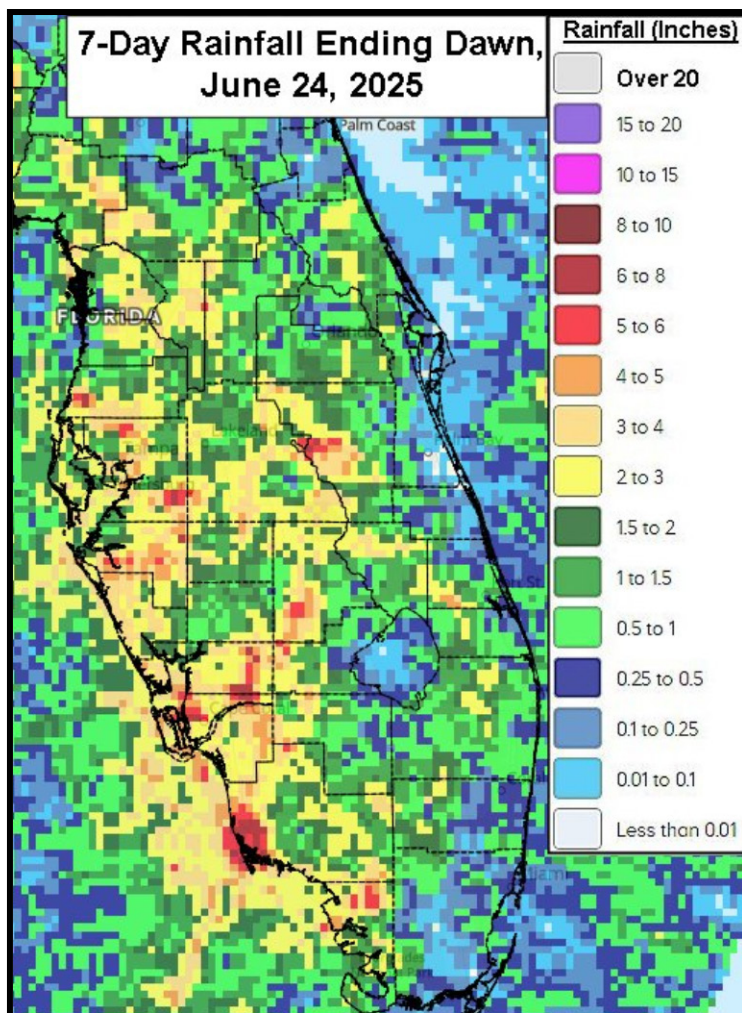
Weekly Citrus Weather

Kansas City, June 24 (World Weather Inc.) – **Florida**'s citrus region saw a good mix of rain and sunshine during the past week. With waves of rain and thunderstorms continuing on a daily basis during the coming week, citrus development conditions will remain generally good. **Mexico**'s citrus areas reported abundant rain at times with flooding possible in portions of Veracruz. Long-term citrus conditions are favorable, though the wettest locations would benefit from a period of drier weather. The main citrus areas in Mexico will remain in a wet weather bias during the coming week and flood potentials will increase. **Brazil**'s citrus areas will have a few opportunities for rain during the coming week. However, resulting precipitation will be too light to significantly slow farming activity.

FLORIDA

Rain was often scattered across the main citrus areas in Florida during the past week. Moisture totals for the seven-day period ending this morning ranged from 0.50 to 3.00 inches with local amounts of 4.00 inches or more near and along the Gulf coast. Pockets in



Brevard and Indian River Counties also only received trace amounts to 0.50 inch of rain. The precipitation combined with irrigation continued to promote a relatively good environment for new citrus growth.

Temperatures were near to slightly above normal across citrus country during the past week. Daytime highs peaked from the upper 80s to mid-90s Fahrenheit. Nighttime lows were in the upper 60s to mid-70s.

A normal weather pattern is slated for Florida's citrus region during the coming week. Afternoon showers and storms will occur on a near daily basis due to sea breezes that usually occur this time of year. Precipitation will be enhanced for portions of crop country Thursday into this weekend as a weak upper-level disturbance passes over the region. Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning

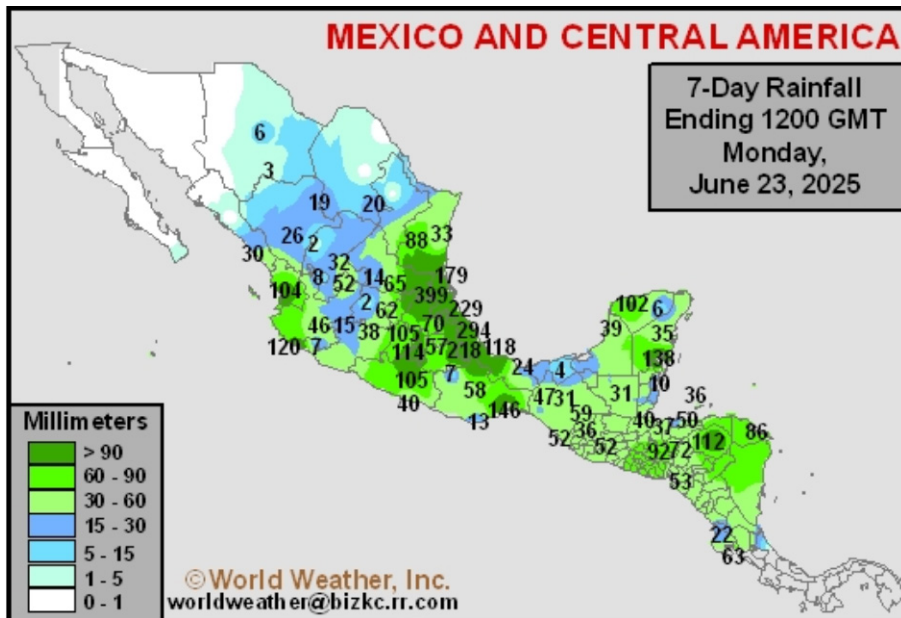
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will range from 1.00 to 3.50 inches and locally more. The combination of rain and irrigation will continue to support a good environment for aggressive citrus growth.

Seasonable temperatures are slated for Florida during the coming week. Daytime highs will peak from the mid-80s to lower 90s with pockets occasionally warming to the mid-90s. Low temperatures will be in the low to mid-70s with pockets occasionally cooling to the upper 60s.

MEXICO

Waves of monsoonal rain were noted across the main citrus areas in Mexico during the past week. Veracruz reported anywhere from 4.65 to 15.71 inches of rain for the seven-day period ending June 23. Puebla, Oaxaca, and Tamaulipas received 0.51 to 5.75 inches of rain. San Luis Potosi, Colima, Michoacan, and portions of Nuevo Leon received 0.59 to 2.56 inches of moisture. Temperatures were near normal with highest readings in the 80s and 90s. However, pockets in northeastern Mexico warmed above 100 degrees at times while pockets in Veracruz only warmed to the 70s. Lowest temperatures were in the 60s and 70s.



Rainfall in recent weeks significantly bolstered soil moisture across the main citrus production areas. Flooding was possible in Veracruz and may have limited farming activity for several days. Overall, production impacts were suspected of being minimal. Long-term citrus conditions

otherwise remain favorable due to the abundant rain. A period of drier weather may be needed in the wettest locations of Veracruz to limit additional flooding.

Monsoonal rain will continue on a near daily basis for east-central and western Mexico during the coming week. Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 2.00 to 6.00 inches with local amounts of 8.00 inches or more in Veracruz. A tropical disturbance could also generate more significant rainfall along the Oaxaca, Michoacan, and Colima coastlines early next week, though there is too much time out in the forecast to have high confidence in the disturbance verifying. Northeastern Mexico will otherwise see a mix of erratic rainfall and sunshine. San Luis Potosi and southern fringes of Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas will receive 0.50 to 3.00 inches of rain by next Tuesday morning. Other locations will not receive enough rain to counter evaporation. Temperatures will be near normal for the main citrus areas. Daytime highs will peak to the 80s and 90s with portions

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of east-central and western Mexico only warming to the 70s during periods of more significant rain. Low temperatures will be in the 60s and 70s.

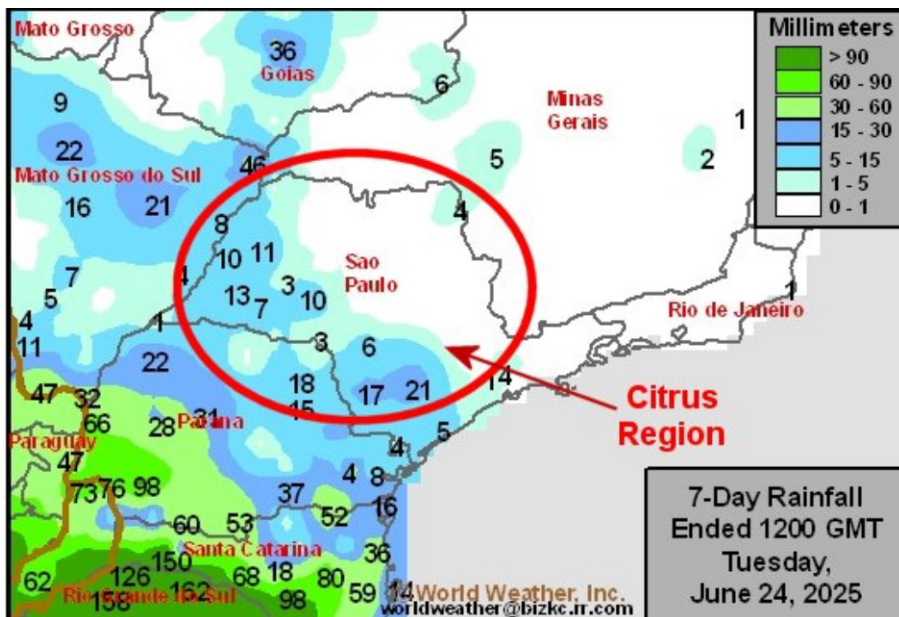
Additional rain during the coming week will continue to promote a good outlook for citrus across Mexico. Northeastern Mexico would benefit from a boost in rain later in July, though the region has enough moisture to support growth in the short-term. Flood concerns may also increase for Veracruz and western Mexico due to the additional rain and the need for drier weather will increase in July.

BRAZIL

Western and southern Sao Paulo saw a mix of erratic rain and sunshine during the past week. Moisture totals for the seven-day period ending this morning ranged from 0.12 to 0.83 inch. Other locations in Sao Paulo and southwestern Minas Gerais were dry or mostly dry. Temperatures were near or slightly above normal with highest readings in the upper 70s and 80s. Lowest temperatures were in the 40s and lower 50s. *The lack of abundant rain*

was beneficial for continued harvesting and general farming activity.

Precipitation will vary across the main citrus areas during the coming week. Southern fringes of Sao Paulo will see periods of rain Thursday into Friday and again early next week. These areas will receive 0.25 to 1.50



inches of rain with local amounts over 2.00 inches by next Tuesday morning. Other locations in Sao Paulo into southwestern Minas Gerais will either be dry or not receive enough rain to counter evaporation. Harvesting and general farming activity should advance around the rain.

Temperatures will often trend above normal, though highs will only reach the 60s and 70s today and Wednesday. Highs will settle to the upper 70s and 80s for the remainder of the coming week with pockets warming to the lower 90s. Low temperatures will be in the upper 30s and 40s Wednesday with a few pockets potentially cooling to the mid-30s. No damaging cold is expected. Low temperatures will otherwise be in the 50s and 60s.

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
