

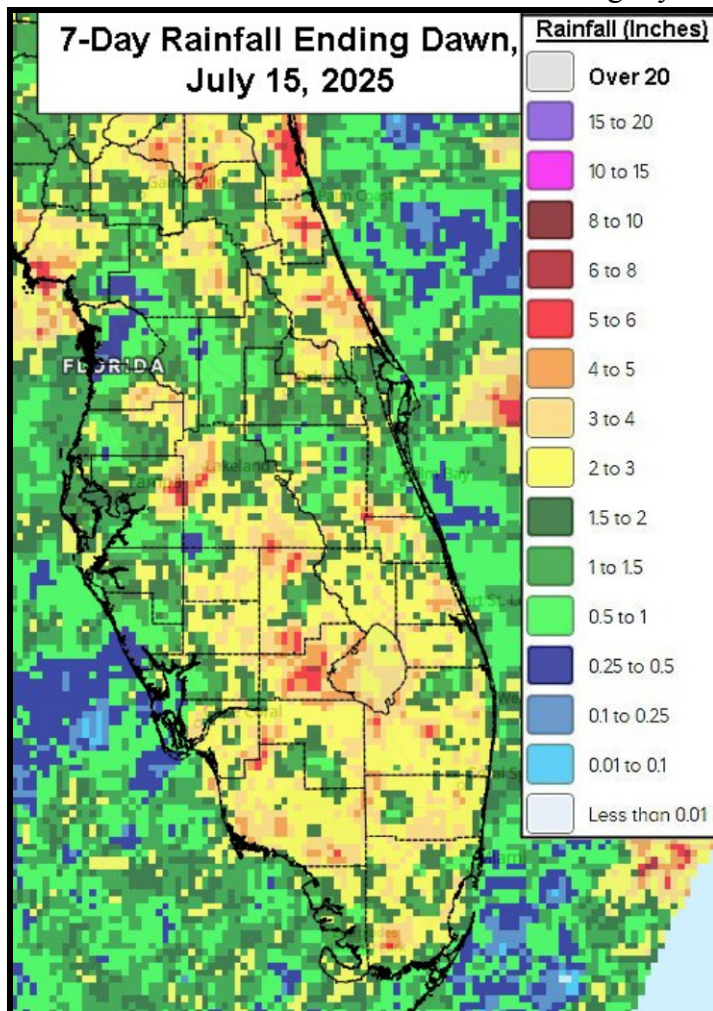
Weekly Citrus Weather

Kansas City, July 15 (World Weather Inc.) – **Florida**'s citrus region received rain on a frequent basis during the past week. Waves of rain will continue during the coming week, though rain totals will be a little lower compared to recent weeks. Long-term production potentials remain relatively favorable due to the additional rain. **Mexico**'s citrus areas also received monsoonal rain on a frequent basis during the past week. Northeastern Mexico missed out on the most significant rain and additional rain would be welcome. East-central and western Mexico will see a good mix of rain and sunshine during the coming week while portions of northeastern Mexico continue to dry down. **Brazil**'s citrus areas will be mostly dry during the coming week. Farming activity will advance with few disruptions.

FLORIDA

Rain was often scattered across the main citrus areas in Florida during the past week. Moisture totals for the seven-day period ending this morning ranged from 1.00 to 4.00 inches with local amounts of 5.00 inches or slightly more in Glades, Highland, and Polk



Counties. A few locations near the Gulf coast also only received 0.50 to 1.00 inch of rain. The additional rain combined with irrigation continued to support a good environment for aggressive citrus growth.

Temperatures were near to slightly above normal in Florida's citrus country during the past week. Daytime highs peaked from the upper 80s to the mid-90s Fahrenheit. Nighttime lows were in the low- to mid-70s.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms due to sea breezes will continue on a frequent basis for Florida during the coming week. However, precipitation will be limited Friday and Saturday when an area of high pressure advances over the region. Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 0.50 to 2.00 inches with local amounts of 3.00 inches or slightly more. The rain and irrigation will continue to promote a good environment for aggressive

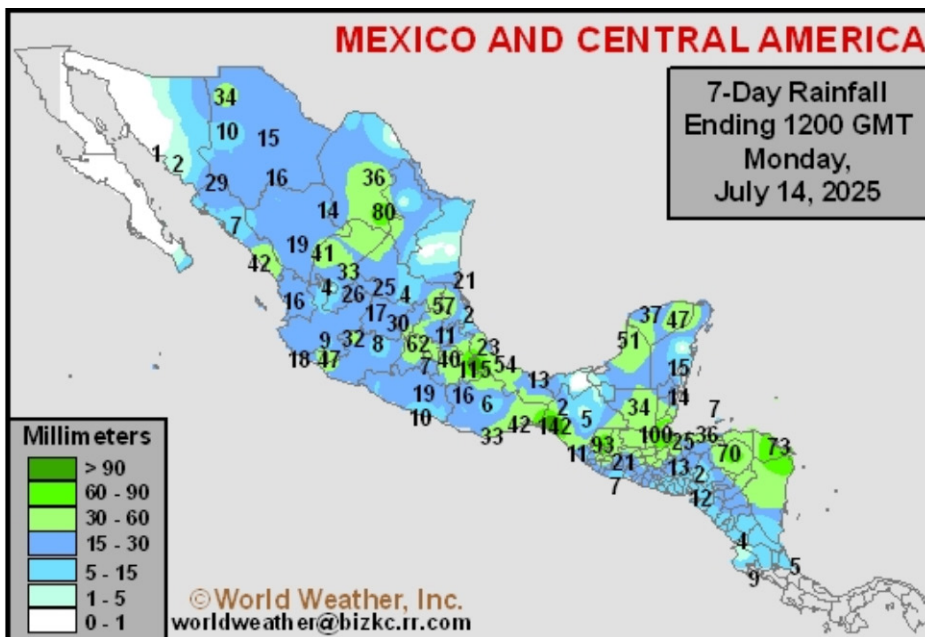
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citrus growth. Production potentials remain favorable.

Seasonable to seasonably warm weather will prevail for Florida during the coming week. Daytime highs will peak from the mid-80s to lower 90s with pockets occasionally warming to the mid-90s. Low temperatures will be in the low- to mid-70s.

MEXICO

Monsoonal rain continued across much of Mexico's citrus region during the past week. Veracruz and Puebla into San Luis Potosi, Oaxaca, Michoacan, and Colima received 0.51 to 2.24 inches of rain with drier pockets for the seven-day period ending July 14. One location in eastern Puebla also reported 4.53 inches of rain. A few locations in Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon also received 0.83 inch of rain or slightly more. Temperatures were near normal with highest readings in the 80s and 90s. Lowest temperatures were in the 60s and 70s.



Citrus conditions remain generally favorable for much of east-central, western, and northeastern Mexico due to the additional rain during the past week. Portions of Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon are drying down a little too much and would benefit from more significant rain.

Long-term production potentials remain favorable.

Waves of monsoonal rain will prevail from western and east-central Mexico into San Luis Potosi during the coming week. Precipitation will occur on a daily basis with some of the most widespread and significant rain occurring through Friday. Moisture totals by next Tuesday morning will range from 0.50 to 3.00 inches with locally more in Colima, Michoacan, and coastal Oaxaca. Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas will otherwise trend drier than usual. Brief periods of light rain will still occur, though most locations will not receive enough rain to counter evaporation. Temperatures will trend near to slightly above normal with daytime highs peaking in the 80s and 90s. Portions of northeastern Mexico will also warm above 100 degrees on a frequent basis. Low temperatures will be in the 60s and 70s.

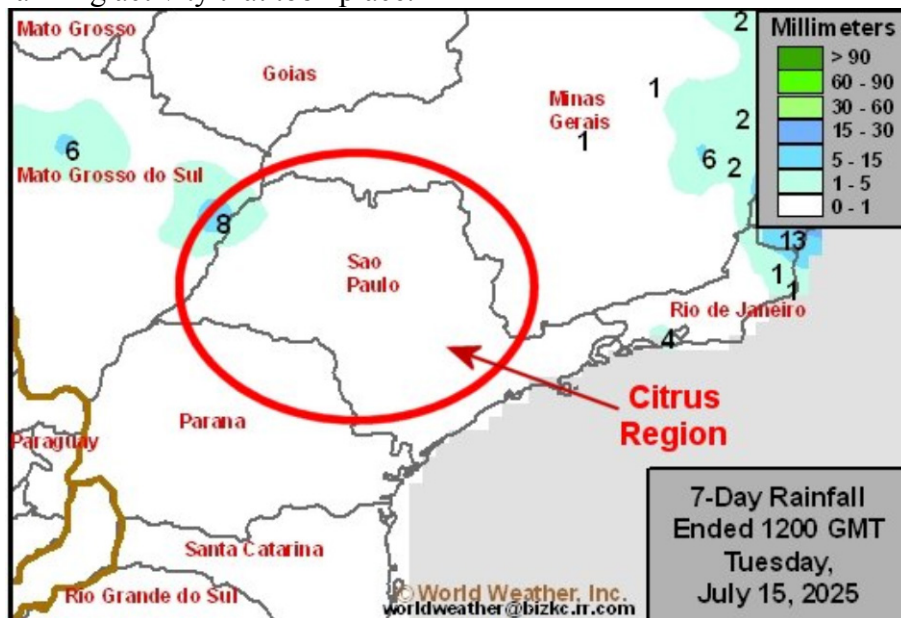
Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon will dry down during the coming week due to the lack of significant rain and warm to hot weather. Short-term citrus development conditions will remain relatively favorable outside the driest pockets. However, the need for more significant rain will increase later this month and early August. The remaining production

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areas in Mexico will receive enough rain to maintain a good environment for aggressive citrus growth.

BRAZIL

Brazil's main citrus areas were dry during the past week. Temperatures were near to slightly above normal with highest readings in the upper 70s and 80s. Lowest temperatures were in the 40s and 50s. The lack of rain was beneficial for any harvesting and general farming activity that took place.



Dry weather will prevail for much of Sao Paulo and southwestern Minas Gerais during the coming week. Any rain that does occur will be rapidly lost to evaporation. Seasonable to seasonably warm weather will persist as well. Daytime highs will reach the upper 70s and 80s with some lower

90s possible late this weekend and early next week. Low temperatures will be in the 40s and 50s with pockets in southwestern Minas Gerais and northern Sao Paulo only cooling to the lower 60s at times. Harvesting and general farming activity will continue with few disruptions.

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
